
Channel 10 News Anchor, *Andrea Cambern*, will emcee this year's event.

Limited Brands, Inc. Grant Will Help Women Develop Careers

A recent \$25,000 grant from Limited Brands, Inc. will provide needed support for the New Directions Career Center's programs and services. Specifically, the Limited Brands grant will be used to serve clients — especially single moms with dependent children. Since 1980, NDCC has focused its programs and services on women in transition, who need to enter or reenter the job market. The types of transitions that bring women to the Center include divorce, death or disablement of a spouse, escape from a

situation of domestic violence, and job loss.

Grants such as the Limited Brands, Inc. grant, allow NDCC to provide services to anyone in need (regardless of ability to pay), plus provide the child care and transportation assistance that many women need so they can participate in programs and training that will lead to economic independence for themselves and their children.

Bostwick Scholarship Awarded

New Directions Career Center recently awarded the Bostwick Memorial Scholarship to Columbus resident, Toska Pearson. The scholarship is given annually in memory of Anne Bostwick, a NDCC career counselor who died in a tragic auto accident in 1991. The scholarship recognizes extraordinary NDCC graduates who pursue additional education as one component of achieving their career goals.

Pearson, a single mother, came to NDCC in 2008. An American Sign Language (ASL) interpreter, she sought the resources of the Center's *New Directions* program to further her career. Said Pearson, "At the NDCC we were

encouraged to dream without barriers. dream where it was open and safe - and dream I did! After the dreaming, we wrote and drew our vision on paper. Then I thought, this doesn't have to stay a vision — it can become a reality. Now I am on the path of reality." She credited the personality tests, open discussions and hands-on exercises in the class as contributors to her decision to pursue more education. "My career goal is to obtain a major in ASL and a minor in deaf culture," stated Pearson, who is now enrolled at Columbus State Community College. She plans to transfer to Gallaudet University in the Fall.

Client Numbers Increasing as Unemployment Rate Rises

Requests for the NDCC programs and services are increasing. This is not surprising, in light of the current economic climate and unemployment rates.

Since October the number of clients served through the Center's regularly scheduled programs have risen. However, the most dramatic increase has occurred in the number of requests from churches and businesses who are seeking the expertise of our licensed career counselors and professional placement

specialist to provide customized services for individuals who have either lost their jobs or are at risk of losing employment.

Program workshops are being developed to meet the identified needs of various groups. Topics covered in these workshops often include resume writing, networking, interviewing skills, eliminating barriers to employment, and developing financial literacy.
