Women of Promise 2013 Recognizes Two Grads

For only the second time in its history, NDCC recognized two outstanding graduates with its "Woman of Promise" award. Kathy Bickel, Vice President for Alumni Affairs at The Ohio State University, an NDCC Board member and co-chair of the 2013 "Women of Promise" event was honored as an early graduate of the Center who has come full circle to now serve as one of the agency's top leaders. The second recipient was Toska Broadway, a professional working with the deaf population.

Bickel arrived at the Center shortly after it was founded in 1980 to participate in what was then called the "Displaced Homemaker Program." As a newly divorced mother with three young children and no college degree, she was frightened yet determined to create a life of economic independence for herself and her children. The Center's licensed counselors and professional career staff helped her build her confi-

dence, chart a career path for herself and find the resources to help her be successful in providing for her children and getting the education she needed to attain her career goals. After completing her Master's degree at OSU's prestigious Fisher College of Business, Bickel became employed by the university. She now leads her team of 21 professionals and reports directly to her boss, Archie Griffin. She is happily re-married and a proud mom to her three children who are now adults.

Broadway came to the Center as a single mom, who was interested in working with the deaf community. After completing NDCC's New Directions program, Toska applied for and was awarded the Center's annual Bostwick scholarship. This scholarship jump-started her educational pursuits. She enrolled in and completed her Associate's degree at Columbus State Community in sign language interpreting. She then moved to Washington D.C. to attend Gallaudet University to pursue a Bachelor's degree. When she decided to attend Gallaudet, Toska knew she wanted to do more to empower the deaf population, but wasn't sure what she wanted to do. During an internship in Costa Rica, she realized she wanted to do more to address poverty and improve the lives of the deaf in developing countries. She just celebrated graduation from her Bachelor's degree program, and will be working this summer in Guatemala to establish a summer camp for deaf children. She recently learned of her acceptance into Gallaudet's graduate school, so this Fall, she will begin pursuit of a Master's degree in International Studies and Development. CONGRATULATIONS to these two outstanding women!

Five NDCC Graduates Receive Scholarships

Scholarship Opportunities for Success (SOS) recently awarded five graduates of New Directions Career Center (NDCC) academic scholarships. The awards ceremony, held April 23rd, honored a total of 26 Central Ohio women. The five NDCC recipients were Jennifer Combs, Michelle Doone, Anne Shea, Tedossi Turner, and Flora Yee.

Established II years ago, SOS is committed to changing lives through the financial support of educational goals. According to Clare Anderson, founding member of SOS, the goal of the non-profit organization is to support financially needy women reach their career goals and create better, more rewarding lives. "Education opens so many doors to families in terms of pay, professional choices, and quality of life. Our hope is that SOS makes post-secondary education a reality for women who might not otherwise be able to afford it."

SOS' mission fits well with NDCC's mission "to empower women in transition to achieve and maintain economic self-sufficiency." That's why NDCC staff diligently promotes SOS to clients. Raeanna O'Brien, the Center's Director of Programs and Services, stated, "Our career specialists make sure that clients are aware of available scholarship monies and, if necessary, help them to understand what information is needed by the specific organization. It's not uncommon for clients to request that we review application paperwork prior to submission."

This effort has resulted in success for many NDCC clients. The five graduates who most recently received money are destined for success as well. Combs - currently a student at Columbus State Community College (CSCC) - plans to, ultimately, secure an engineering degree from The Ohio State University. Doone, Shea, and Yee plan to attend nursing programs at area schools. Turner is pursuing an accounting degree with initial work at CSCC and final studies at Franklin University.

Linda Danter, Executive Director, expressed her pride of the five women who completed NDCC programs. Combs, Doone, Turner, and Yee are all graduates of the E' Program, which is underwritten by the Women's Leadership Council of the United Way of Central Ohio. "Our career development services are designed to position women for both personal and professional success," she said. "The unprecedented award of five SOS Scholarships to NDCC clients in one year, speaks to the determination of these women as well the success of the Center's Programs and Services."
